Interviewing Dates	June 24 - 25, 2022
Target population	U.S. adults, aged 18 and over.
Sampling method	Respondents were selected from YouGov's opt-in Internet panel to be representative of all U.S. adults.
Weighting	The sample was weighted based on gender, age, race, and education, based on the American Community Survey, conducted by the U.S. Bureau of the Census, as well as 2020 Presidential vote (or non vote), and voter registration status. The weights range from 0.337 to 3.304, with a mean of 1 and a standard deviation of 0.45.
